Implementation of the program is expected to increase the mental health literacy among adults who work in diverse environments such as YMCA, recreational centers, Big Brothers Big Sisters, PTAs, Capital Metro, places of worship, neighborhood associations, Boys & Girls Clubs, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, & CASA volunteers.
